CULTURE CORNER 7

The USA'S Dangerous Wild Animals

A Over a million **alligators** live in slow-moving rivers, lakes, marshes and swamps in the southern states of Florida, Louisiana, Texas and Georgia. They are usually 3 to 5 metres long and eat almost anything, swallowing it whole. They often hide **motionless**, usually waiting to **snatch** their prey and **drag** it under the water. Never try to feed alligators or walk too close to the edge of the water. *You don't want to become an alligator's next meal!*

Fascinating fact: Alligators have about 80 teeth which are replaced **continuously**. Throughout their lifetime they go through at least 2,000 of them!



Rattlesnakes live mostly in the southwestern states, such as California and Arizona and are the most common type of **poisonous** snake in the country. There are 16 different species, but they all have one thing in common – a rattle on their tail that is used to **warn** other creatures (and people!) to stay away. A rattlesnake bite is very **painful** and the venom can be **fatal**. So, when you are walking in an area where there could be snakes, watch where you step. If you know there are rattlesnakes around, wear strong leather boots!



Fascinating fact: Baby rattlesnakes are able to attack prey minutes after they are born!



C **Grizzly bears** live alongside streams, lakes and rivers in Alaska and northwestern states such as Idaho, Montana, Washington and Wyoming. Although sightings are not very common, these huge animals are the most dangerous of all bears and can easily kill or seriously injure humans. They can be **unpredictable** and ferocious, especially when they are hungry, injured or with their cubs. So, if a bear approaches you, don't run and if you are attacked, lie face down and play dead!

Fascinating fact: Grizzlies can run much faster than humans and even climb trees!

D **Raccoons** might look cute and cuddly, but they can actually carry many **diseases**, including rabies, a deadly virus. They are often found in attics or garages, or searching for food in rubbish bins, which they can open with their paws. If you see a raccoon don't touch it. If you are ever scratched by one, wash the scratch well and see a doctor immediately.



Fascinating fact: Some raccoons manage to get into kitchens through **cat flaps**!

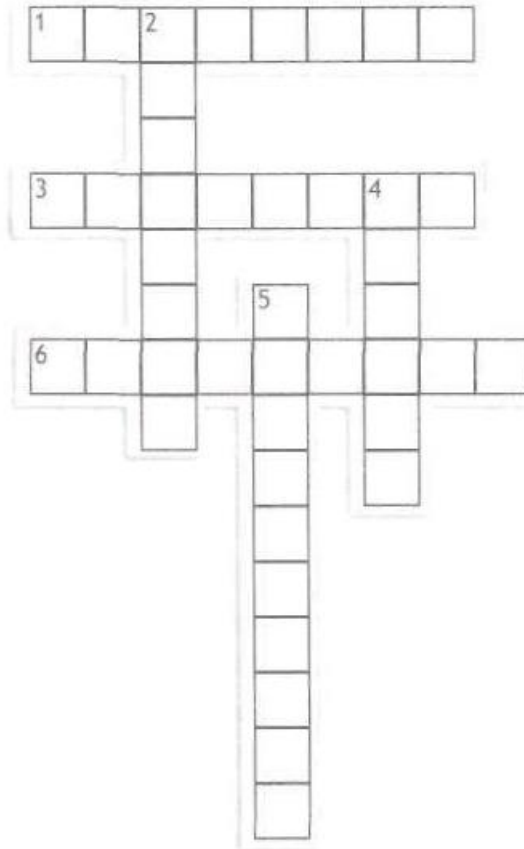

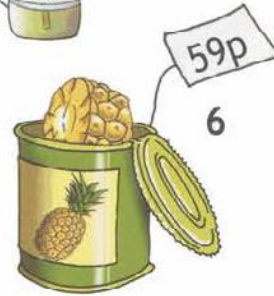
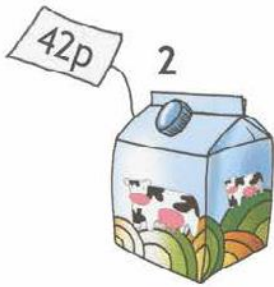

All the banknotes in the UK have a portrait of Queen Elizabeth II on the front and a **0** ► *famous* (fame) historical person on the back. Read on to find out more...

The five-pound note, or fiver, is blue and green in colour and has a portrait of Elizabeth Fry on the back. Fry made her name by **improving** living conditions for women in European prisons. The main **1** (illustrate) on the note shows her reading to female **2** (prison) in Newgate Prison.

The ten-pound note, or tenner, is orange in colour. It was first issued in 1759. Since 2000, Victorian naturalist, Charles Darwin, who **developed** the theory of **evolution**, has been on the back of the note. You can also see Darwin's ship the HMS Beagle as well as **3** (vary) flowers and animals he came across on his travels, in particular the humming bird.

The twenty-pound note is purple and up until very **4** (recent), it had a picture of British **5** (compose), Sir Edward Elgar, on the back. The new twenty-pound note shows Adam Smith, one of the fathers of modern day economics.

The fifty-pound note is red and has a picture of Sir John Houblon on the back. Houblon was the first **governor** of the Bank of England. This note also shows an image of Houblon's house in Threadneedle Street, London which is the **site** of the bank's present day **6** (build).

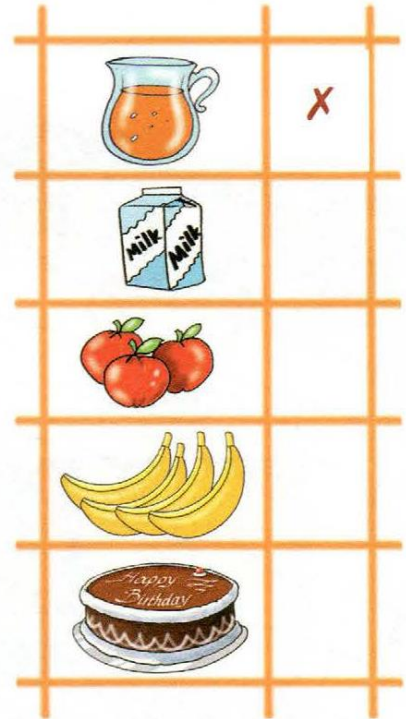

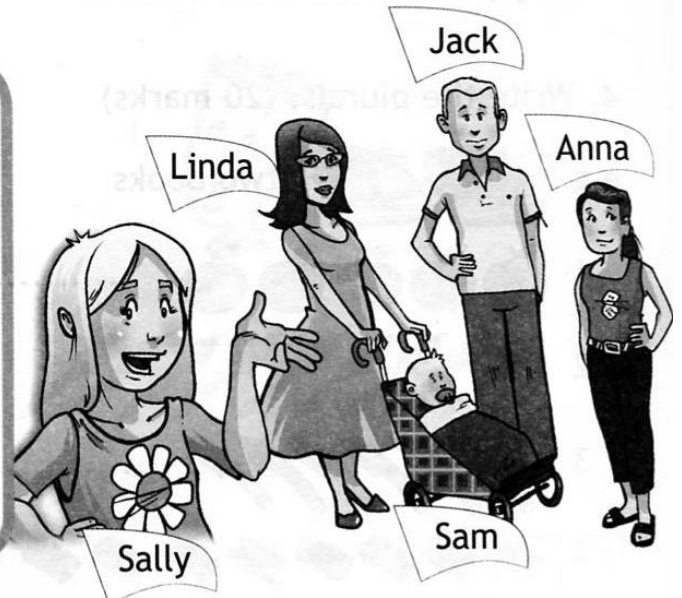

SHOPPING for FLEAS?



A flea is a very small and **troublesome** insect that can drive a dog crazy with all the itching and scratching it causes. So what do fleas have to do with markets and shopping? No one is quite sure, as the origins of the term 'flea market' are not certain. Some people believe it **originates** from the Dutch language, others think it stems from French. But there is one thing that almost everybody agrees on: there's no better place to shop if you are **in search of** a good bargain.

There are **countless** flea markets all around the world, and they are especially popular in Europe. One of the busiest markets in Europe is in the town of Lille, Northern France: La Braderie. With two hundred kilometres of open air stalls, this flea market offers a **massive diversity** of things to buy at reduced prices. Unfortunately, this amazing event, which has over a million visitors, is only an annual event which happens during the first weekend of September. Another **shopper's paradise** is in Russia. Moscow has many flea markets but the Vernisazh flea market at Izmailovsky Park is perhaps the most famous. But flea markets are not just places where tourists can buy inexpensive things. The Annex Antiques Fair and Flea Market in New York, USA, is a **trendy** market which has been attracting famous Hollywood stars as well as people living in the area ever since it opened.
